Students should read from a variety of genre and authors.

Students must read a minimum of four books.

One of the four books must be the following required book:

There is not a consensus among experts on the best way to determine a reading level for a book. Remember the best books are those read and enjoyed by your child. These levels are guidelines only and should never be the sole consideration in determining if a book is appropriate for your child.

Anderson, M. T.: *Whales on Stilts*

Racing against the clock, shy middle-school student Lily and her best friends, Katie and Jasper, must foil the plot of her father's conniving boss to conquer the world using an army of whales. AR 4.6 RC 4.3 Lexile 760 ♥

Birney, Berry: *The Seven Wonders of Sassafras Springs*

Eben McAllister searches his small town to see if he can find anything comparable to the real Seven Wonders of the World. AR 4.8 RC 4.5 ♥

Blume, Judy: *Double Fudge*

His younger brother's obsession with money and the discovery of long-lost cousins Flora and Fauna provide many embarrassing moments for twelve-year-old Peter. AR 3.6 AR 4.5

Broach, Elise: *Masterpiece*

.After Marvin, a beetle, makes a miniature drawing as an eleventh birthday gift for James, a human with whom he shares a house, the two new friends work together to help recover a Durer drawing stolen from the Metropolitan Museum of Art. AR 4.8 RC 6.1 Notable Book ♥

Butler, Dori Hillestad: *Trading Places with Tank Talbott*

Jason, who would rather work on his horror movie screenplay than learn to swim, finds an unlikely ally in Tank, the class bully, who is being forced to take ballroom dance lessons. AR 3.4 RC 3.7 Lexile 530

Cleary, Beverly: *Henry and Ribsy*

Before he can go fishing with his father, Henry must keep his dog Ribsy out of trouble for a month. AR 4.6 RC 5.1

Cooper, Susan: *The Boggart*

After visiting the castle in Scotland which her family has inherited and returning home to Canada, twelve-year-old Emily finds that she has accidentally brought back with her a boggart, an invisible and mischievous spirit with a fondness for practical jokes. AR 6.9 RC 6.9 ♥

Creech, Sharon: *The Castle Corona*

Two orphaned peasant children discover a mysterious pouch, the contents of which lead them to the majestic Castle Corona, where their lives may be transformed forever. Many other books by this author are wonderful. AR 5.5 RC 5.4 ♥

Crisp, Marty: *White Star: A Dog on the Titanic*

Twelve-year-old Sam, a passenger on the Titanic's maiden sea voyage, volunteers to help care for the dogs in the ocean liner's kennel and becomes fast friends with the Irish setter of J. Bruce Ismay, the ship's owner. AR 4.7 RC 5.2 Lexile 780

Davies, Jacqueline: *The Lemonade War*

Evan and his younger sister, Jesse, react very differently to the news that they will be in the same class for fourth grade and as the end of summer approaches, they battle it out through lemonade stands, each trying to be the first to earn 100 dollars. Includes mathematical calculations and tips for running a successful lemonade stand.

DeFelice, Cynthia: *The Missing Manatee*

While coping with his parents' separation, eleven-year-old Skeet spends most of Spring Break in his skiff on a Florida river, where he finds a manatee shot to death and begins looking for the killer. AR 4.9 RC 5.0

Dicamillo, Kate: *Because of Winn Dixie*

Ten-year-old India Opal Buloni describes her first summer in the town of Naomi, Florida, and all the good things that happen to her because of her big ugly dog Winn-Dixie. AR 3.9 RC 4.1 Lexile 610 ♥

DiCamillo, Kate: *The Tale of Despereaux*

The adventures of Despereaux Tilling, a small mouse of unusual talents, the princess that he loves, the servant girl who longs to be a princess and a devious rat determined to bring them all to ruin. AR 4.7 ♥ Newbery Honor

Etchemendy, Nancy: *The Power of Un*

When he is given a device that will allow him to "undo" what has happened in the past, Gib Finney is not sure what event from the worst day in his life he should change in order to keep his sister from being hit by a truck. AR 4.8 RC 4.7

Fitzhugh, Louise: *Harriet the Spy*

Eleven-year-old Harriet keeps notes on her classmates and neighbors in a secret notebook, but when some of the students read the notebook, they seek revenge. AR 4.5 RC 6.2 Lexile 760

Fleischman, Sid: *Bandit's Moon*

Twelve-year-old Annyrose, left behind when her brother joins the Gold Rush, escapes the unscrupulous woman she is staying with and sets out on a grand adventure with the notorious bandit Joaquin Murieta and his band of outlaws. AR 4.2 RC 4.5 ♥

Fleming, Candace: *The Fabled Fourth Graders of Aesop Elementary School*

An unlikely teacher takes over the disorderly fourth-grade class of Aesop Elementary School with surprising results. Good selection for fans of *The Wayside School* books by Louis Sachar. AR 3.9

Giff, Patricia Riley: *Eleven*

When Sam, who can barely read, discovers an old newspaper clipping just before his eleventh birthday, it brings forth memories from his past, and, with the help of a new friend at school and the castle they are building for a school project, his questions are eventually answered. AR 4.1 RC 3.4 ♥

Gilson, Jamie: *4B Goes Wild*

Fourth graders on a three-day camping trip with their teachers experience frights and delights. RC 5.3

Gordon, Amy: *The Gorillas of Gill Park*

While spending the summer before seventh grade with his aunt, Willy Wilson finds his first friends ever in the colorful characters who all love the neighborhood park owned by an eccentric old man. AR 4.7 RC 4.2

Gutman, Dan: *The Homework Machine*

Four fifth-grade students--a geek, a class clown, a teacher's pet, and a slacker--as well as their teacher and mothers, each relate events surrounding a computer programmed to complete homework assignments. ♥

Hannigan, Katherine: *Ida B: And Her Plans to Maximize Fun, Avoid Disaster, and (Possibly) Save the World*

In Wisconsin, fourth-grader Ida B spends happy hours being home-schooled and playing in her family's apple orchard, until her mother begins treatment for breast cancer and her parents must sell part of the orchard and send her to public school. AR 5.3 RC 6.4 ♥

Hawking, Lucy & Stephen: *George's Secret Key to the Universe*

George and his neighbor friend Eric travel through a computer portal into outer space encountering black holes while trying to escape an evil scientist. AR 5.6 RC 5.2 Lexile 850

Horvath, Polly: *The Trolls*

Eccentric Aunt Sally comes from Canada to babysit the Anderson children while their parents are on a trip to Paris, and each night, the bedtime story adds another piece to a very suspicious family history. AR 5.4 RC 4.9 Lexile 810 ♥ Notable Book

Hyland, Hilary: *The Wreck of the Ethie*

Fictionalized account of the wreck of the steamship Ethie which occurred on the remote western coast of Newfoundland in December 1919 and in which the dog Skipper proved his heroism. AR 5.6 RC 5.1

Juster, Norton: *The Phantom Tollbooth*

Milo travels through a magical tollbooth and begins a journey to the Kingdom of Wisdom, where he and a "watch" dog named Tock try to end the feud between numbers and words. AR 6.7 RC 5.4 Lexile 1000

Karr, Kathleen: *The Great Turkey Walk*

In 1860, fifteen-year-old third-grader Simon Green attempts to herd one thousand turkeys from Missouri to Denver, Colorado, in hopes of selling them at a profit. AR 4.5 RC 4.8 Lexile 700

Karwoski, Gail: *Seaman: The Dog who Explored the West with Lewis and Clark*

Seaman, a Newfoundland, proves his value as a hunter, navigator, and protector while serving with the Corps of Discovery when it explores the West under the leadership of Lewis and Clark. AR 6.0 RC 5.5

Lin, Grace: *The Year of the Dog*

Frustrated at her seeming lack of talent for anything, a young Taiwanese American girl sets out to apply the lessons of the Chinese Year of the Dog, those of making best friends and finding oneself, to her own life. AR 4.2 RC 5.2 ♥ Notable Book

Manes, Stephen: *Be a Perfect Person in Just Three Days!*

Milo, tired of problems with his sister, parents, and classmates, finds a book in the library which promises to make him perfect in just three days. RC 4.5

Martin, Ann M.: *Ten Kids, No Pets*

The ten Rosso children, spaced a year apart and named alphabetically, find their life rambunctious and exciting when their family leaves New York City for a big old farmhouse and new friends. AR 4.4 RC 5.4 Lexile 700

Mortenson, Greg: *Three Cups of Tea* (for elementary students)

Adapted for young readers Greg Mortenson's book in which he recounts the experiences he had while trying to help impoverished villages in Pakistan's Karakoram Himalaya build schools for their children. AR 6.1 RC 5.9 Lexile 910

Myers, Laurie: *Surviving Brick Johnson*

Afraid of getting maimed for making fun of Brick, the husky new kid in his fifth-grade class, Nick decides that even his baseball collection will not protect him so he signs up for karate class, despite his little brother's reassurances that Brick is not a bully. Nitz, Kristine Wolden: *Saving the Griffin*

When eleven-year-old Kate and her younger brother Michael encounter a baby griffin in an Italian garden, they vow to help the creature find its way back home and to keep Griffio's existence a secret. AR 3.6 RC 2.9 Lexile 550

Peck, Richard: *A Long Way From Chicago*

A boy recounts his annual summer trips to rural Illinois with his sister during the Great Depression to visit their larger-than-life grandmother. AR 5.0 RC 4.6 Newbery Honor ♥

Peck, Richard: *A Year Down Yonder*

Sequel to *A Long way from Chicago*. During the recession of 1937, fifteen-year-old Mary Alice is sent to live with her feisty grandmother in rural Illinois and comes to a better understanding of this fearsome woman. AR 4.5 RC 4.9 Newbery Medal ♥

Ryan, Pam Munoz: *Esperanza Rising*

Esperanza and her mother are forced to leave their life of wealth and privilege in Mexico to go work in the labor camps of Southern California, where they must adapt to the harsh circumstances facing Mexican farm workers on the eve of the Great Depression. AR 5.3 RC 5.5 Notable Book ♥

Sachar, Louis: *There's a Boy in the Girls' Bathroom*

An unmanageable, but lovable, eleven-year-old misfit learns to believe in himself when he gets to know the new school counselor, who is a sort of misfit too. AR 3.4 RC 5.5

Selznick, Brian: *The Houdini Box*

A chance encounter with Harry Houdini leaves a small boy in possession of a mysterious box--one that might hold the secrets to the greatest magic tricks ever performed. AR 5.0 RC 5.3 Lexile 840

Speare, Elizabeth George: *The Sign of the Beaver*

Left alone to guard the family's wilderness home in eighteenth-century Maine, a boy is hard-pressed to survive until local Indians teach him their skills. AR 4.9 RC 5.7 Lexile 770 Newbery Honor

Spinelli, Jerry: *Maniac Magee*

After his parents die, Jeffrey Lionel Magee's life becomes legendary, as he accomplishes athletic and other feats which awe his contemporaries. AR 4.7 RC 5.4 Notable Book, Newbery Medal ♥

Weston, Elise: *The Coastwatcher*

While eleven-year-old Hugh, his family, and his cousin Tom are spending the summer of 1943 on the South Carolina shore to escape the polio epidemic, Hugh uncovers clues that point to a German plot to sabotage a nearby naval base. AR 4 RC 3.3 Lexile 600

Winthrop, Elizabeth: *The Castle in the Attic*

A gift of a toy castle, complete with silver knight, introduces William to an adventure involving magic and a personal quest. RC 5.9

Sequel: *Battle for the Castle*

Sequel to: *The Castle in the Attic*. Twelve-year-old William uses the magic token to return, through the toy castle in his attic, to the medieval land of Sir Simon, which is now menaced by a skeleton ship bearing a plague of ravenous rats. AR 4.4 RC 5.6

Brooks, Walter R.: *Freddy the Pig*

Follow Freddy the pig and his barnyard friends on their many adventures. The popularity of these older stories is attributed to the richness of the characters and the wisdom of their sentiments. Mr. Young enjoyed these stories when he was an elementary school student. AR 5.0-6.0 ♥

Byng, Georgia: *Molly Moon*

Molly Moon, living in a dreary orphanage in a small English town, discovers a hidden talent for hypnotism and hypnotizes her way from one adventure to another--from one continent to another! AR 5.0-6.0 Lexile 750-800

Cleary, Beverly: *Ramona Quimby*

Humorous stories about Ramona and her family AR 4.5-5.5 Lexile

Dixon, Franklin W.: *The Hardy Boys*

Adventure stories in which young detectives Frank and Joe Hardy investigate suspicious happenings. AR 5.0-6.0

Eager, Edward: *Half Magic*

Four children looking forward to an ordinary summer enjoy a series of fantastic adventures.

Gutman, Dan: *The Million Dollar ... Kick / Strike / Shot*

Humorous stories featuring high-stake contests, riveting sports action, and friendship. AR 3.8-4.7

Hale, Bruce: *Chet Gecko*

The star of this hilarious mystery is non other than green-scaled, smart-aleck fourth grader, Chet Gecko, an intrepid, private-eye lizard. AR 3.5-4.5 Lexile 400-500

Henry, Marguerite: *Misty of Chincoteague*

Two youngsters' determination to own a Chincoteague pony is greatly increased when the Phantom and her colt are among those rounded up for the yearly auction. RC 5.8 Newbery Honor

Jenkins & LaHaye: *Left Behind for Kids*

The kids in the Young Tribulation Force, a group of teens left behind on Earth after God's Rapture, must decide whether to run, hide, or face the enemy.

Keene, Carolyn: *Nancy Drew*

Teen sleuth Nancy Drew, and her friends George and Bess, solve mysteries.

Korman, Gordon: *Everest*

Four kids are prepared to go into thin air in order to become the youngest person ever to climb Everest. But they are not prepared for the challenges. AR 3.5-4.5 Lexile 400-500

Lupica, Mike: *Comeback Kids*

Young sports aficionados team up to help each other succeed in both sports and school.. AR 5.0 Lexile 500-600

Marsh, Carole: *Carole Marsh Mysteries*

Follow the adventures of children who solve mysteries at locations such as Disney World and the New Atlanta Aquarium

Martin, Ann M.: *The Doll People*

A family of porcelain dolls that has lived in the same house for one hundred years is taken aback when a new family of plastic dolls arrives and doesn't follow The Doll Code of Honor. AR 4.0 RC 3.8 Lexile 570

Mazer, Anne: *The Amazing Days of Abby Hayes*

Abby, the quirky girl with the unmanageable red hair, feels left out when compared to her talented siblings. She takes solace by writing in her journal--and that may be exactly where her hidden talent will show through.

Myers, Bill: *Incredible Worlds of Wally McDoogle*

Twelve-year-old Wally, a computer whiz who is a "walking disaster area," has many unlikely adventures but always learns a lesson.

Nimmo, Jenny: *Charlie Bone*

Charlie Bone's life with his widowed mother and two grandmothers undergoes a dramatic change when he discovers that he can hear people in photographs talking. Harry Potter fans may enjoy this series. AR 4.8 RC 5.4

Ogilvy, Ian: *Measle and the Wrathmonk*

Twelve-year-old orphan Measle Stubbs is shrunk down to half an inch tall and placed in a train set by his evil guardian, the Wrathmonk. AR 5.6 RC 5.9 Lexile 900

Snicket, Lemony: *Series of Unfortunate Events*

Tales of three likable, resilient, and unfortunate Baudelaire orphans, Violet, Klaus, and Sunny, in search of a home--stories that are literary and irreverent, hilarious and deftly crafted. AR 6.0-7.0 Lexile 1000-1200

Stewart, Trenton Lee: *The Mysterious Benedict Society*

After passing a series of mind-bending tests, four children are selected for a secret mission that requires them to go undercover at the Learning Institute for the Very Enlightened, where the only rule is that there are no rules. AR 5.6 RC 6.3 Lexile 840 ♥

Van Draanen, Wendelin: *Sammy Keys*

Seventh-grade sleuth Sammy Keyes, a girl, investigates mysterious happenings. AR 4.0-6.0

Various authors: *39 Clues*

Amy and Dan, members of the powerful Cahill family, try to uncover the thirty-nine clues which will reveal the secrets of their lineage. AR 4.0-5.0 Lexile 500-600

Various authors: *Dear America / My Name is America*

Written in a diary format, each historical novel is extensively researched from actual letters and diaries, allowing readers to experience the daily lives of girls from different times in American history. A companion series--My Name Is America--follows the adventures of boys from America's past.

Various authors: *The Royal Diaries*

Intriguing and vivid portraits of historical characters written by noted fiction writers in diary format. Many include black-and-white drawings, photos, and historical notes about each era. AR 5.0-6.0

Math & Puzzles

Berlin, Eric: *The Potato Chip Puzzles*

Winston and his friends enter an all-day puzzle contest to win fifty-thousand dollars for their school, but they must also figure out who is trying to keep them from winning. Puzzles for the reader to solve are included throughout the text. AR 4.4 RC 3.5 Lexile 650

Berlin, Eric: *The Puzzling World of Winston Breen*

Winston Breen loves solving puzzles; and when his sister uncovers a twenty-five-year-old scavenger hunt--which leads to a ring worth thousands of dollars--he and his family jump at the opportunity to solve it. AR 4.2 RC 3.5 Lexile 670

Leedy, Loreen: *Fraction Action*

Miss Prime and her animal students explore fractions by finding many examples in the world around them. RC 2.1 Lexile 330

Neuschwander, Cindy: *Sir Cumference and the First Round Table*

A math adventure in which King Arthur finds the perfect shape for his table with the ideas of his wife and son, and the assistance of his knight, Sir Cumference. AR 4.3 RC 4.8 Lexile 600

Schwartz, David: *G is for Googol*

Explains the meaning of mathematical terms which begin with the different letters of the alphabet from abacus, binary, and cubit to zillion. AR 5.4 RC 5.5 Lexile 760 ♥

Classic Fiction Abridged versions are very good

Baum, Frank L.: *The Wizard of Oz*

The story of Dorothy, a young girl who is transported by a cyclone to the magical world of Oz where she makes wonderful friends, battles evil, and must face down a wizard to return home to Kansas. RC 6.9

Burnett, Frances Hodgson: *A Little Princess*

Sara Crewe, a pupil at Miss Minchin's London School, is left in poverty when her father dies, but is later rescued by a mysterious benefactor. AR 6 RC 5.5 Lexile 930

Burnett, Frances Hodgson: *The Secret Garden*

A ten-year-old orphan comes to live in a lonely house on the Yorkshire moors where she discovers an invalid cousin and the mysteries of a locked garden. Includes review questions. AR 6.3 Lexile 950

Grahame, Kenneth: *The Wind in the Willows*

A classic animal story featuring friends Toad, Mole, Rat, and Badger celebrates the book's seventy-fifth anniversary. AR 8.2

Knight, Eric: *Lassie Come Home*

A collie undertakes a 1000-mile journey in order to once again meet her former master at the school gate. AR 5.4 RC 5.8 Lexile 780

Lewis, C. S.: *The Lion, the Witch, and the Wardrobe* (series)

The special adventures of several children who find their way to the magic land of Narnia and assist Aslan, the golden lion, to triumph over evil. AR 5.0-6.0

Lofting, Hugh: *The Story of Dr. Dolittle* (series)

The whimsical adventures of Dr. Dolittle, a man who loved animals so much that he switched his medical practice from humans to animals and learned to speak animal languages.

London, Jack: *White Fang*

Follows the adventures of a dog who is part wolf as he eventually makes his peace with man in the wilderness of northern Canada. AR 7.4

Montgomery, Lucy Maud: *Anne of Green Gables* (series)

Anne, an eleven-year-old orphan, is sent by mistake to live with a lonely, middle-aged brother and sister on a Prince Edward Island farm and proceeds to make an indelible impression on everyone around her. Includes review questions. AR 7.3 Lexile 1000

Spyri, Johanna: *Heidi*

A Swiss orphan is heartbroken when she must leave her beloved grandfather and their happy home in the mountains to go to school and to care for an invalid girl in the city. Includes review questions. AR 8.2 Lexile 1000

Stevenson, Robert Lewis: *Treasure Island*

While going through the possessions of a deceased guest who owed them money, the mistress of the inn and her son find a treasure map that leads them to a pirate's fortune. AR 7.0

Travers, P. L.: *Mary Poppins* (series)

This classic series tells the story of the world's most beloved nanny, who brings enchantment and excitement with her everywhere she goes. AR 5.0-6.0

White, E. B.: *Charlotte's Web*

Wilbur, the pig, is desolate when he discovers that he is destined to be the farmer's Christmas dinner until his spider friend, Charlotte, decides to help him. Newbery Honor

Wyss, Johann David: *The Swiss Family Robinson*

Relates the fortunes of a shipwrecked family as they adapt to life on an island with abundant animal and plant life. AR 9.7 Lexile 1260

Biography

Borden, Louise: *The Journey That Saved Curious George: The True Wartime Escape of Margret and H.A. Rey*

Tells how the creators of "Curious George" narrowly escaped capture by the Nazis while fleeing Paris on their bicycles during World War II. AR 6.1 Notable Book ♥

Brewster, Hugh: *Anastasia's Album: The Last Tsar's Youngest Daughter Tells Her Own Story*

Photographs and excerpts from personal letters tell the story of Anastasia, daughter of Tsar Nicholas II, who is believed to have been executed along with the rest of her family during the Russian revolution in 1918. AR 6.4 RC 5.9 Notable Book ♥

Dahl, Roald: *Boy: Tales of Childhood*

Presents humorous anecdotes from the author's childhood which includes summer vacations in Norway and an English boarding school. AR 6.0 RC 6.4 Notable Book

Delano, Marge: *Genius: A Photobiography of Albert Einstein*

Presents a biography of Albert Einstein, in words and photographs, and examines the life of the physicist whose theories revolutionized the way science views the space-time continuum, and integrates Einstein's political, cultural, and social interests with his scientific beliefs. AR 7.6 Notable Book ♥

Freeman, Russell: *Lincoln: a Photobiography*

Photographs and text trace the life of the Civil War President. AR 7.7 RC 6.5 Newbery Medal ♥

George, Jean: *The Tarantula in My Purse: And 172 Other Wild Pets*

A collection of autobiographical stories about raising a houseful of children and wild pets including crows, skunks, and raccoons. AR 5.4 RC 5.9 ♥

Krull, Kathleen: *The Boy Who Invented TV: the Story of Philo Farnsworth*

Presents a picture-book biography of Philo Farnsworth, who created the world's first television image in 1928. AR 5.5 Lexile 860

Paulsen, Gary: *My Life in Dog Years*

The author describes how dogs have impacted his life from childhood through the present day, recounting the stories of his first dog, Snowball, in the Philippines; Dirk, who protected him from bullies; and Cookie, who saved his life. AR 5.6 RC 5.2 Notable Book ♥

Rector, Anne Elizabeth: *Anne Elizabeth's Diary*

Presents a selection of writings and drawings from the diary of Anne Elizabeth Rector, a twelve-year-old girl who lived in New York City in 1912, and includes sidebars that describe Rector's life and family, as well as notable people, places, and events of the time. AR 5.5 ♥

Scieszka, Jon: *Knucklehead: Tall Tales & Mostly True Stories About Growing Up Scieszka*

Presents a memoir of what it was like to grow up in the 1950s and other almost true stories by American children's author Jon Scieszka. RC 4.3 Lexile 750 ♥

Nonfiction

Armstrong, Jennifer: *The American Story: 100 True Tales from American History*

Contains 100 short stories about real people and events in American history, arranged chronologically from 1565 to 2000, including the lost colony of Roanoke, Pocahontas, the Chicago fire, and the 2000 presidential election. AR 8.1 RC 6.4 ♥ Notable Book

Buchanan, Andrea: *The Daring Book for Girls*

Provides information on various topics and instructions for several activities, covering women spies, the Bill of Rights, friendship bracelets, paper airplanes, cartwheels, games, changing a tire, and others.

Bredeson, Carmen: *NASA Planetary Spacecraft: Galileo, Magellan, Pathfinder, and Voyager*

Discusses the roles of several NASA spacecrafts which carried out probes during explorations of the planets. AR 7.3

Cerullo, Mary: *The Truth about Great White Sharks*
